




First, generally speaking, would you say that things in Oregon are headed in the right direction or would you say they're on the wrong track? A1




How much of a problem has the rising price of gasoline been for you and your family lately:?



How much of a problem do you think rising fuel prices are going to be for the country as a whole?




Note that we perceive the problem is much worse for 'others' than for ourselves.






Price level you think you'd cut back fuel consumption **BY AT LEAST HALF**, either by driving less or using a more efficient vehicle: (C1)















Energy solutions require government action because voluntary actions aren't getting the job done. 62-1












If you vote, which of the following best describes how you usually vote, mostly/only republican, mostly/only democrat or a little of both republican or democrat?




Age profile




